## Mag No 0229 - Sunday 14th March 1999 - The Old Crown at Ogbourne St George

What a glorious day for a run. Bright spring sunshine - clear blue skies - daffodils and primroses in colourful profusion nodding in the warm breeze. Yet only a privileged few were there to enjoy this memorable run set by Ian. It was mothers day I suppose and a lot of our members have mothers.
