

Hash 189 - The Harrow, Wanborough, 3 April 2005

Hash 191 - a final reminder that this will not be a circular trail! It is a *race* for runners - practice for the Ridgeway Transvestite Geriatric Gallop - and a walk for walkers. There will be a trail laid from Ramsbury to The Roebuck at Marlborough - walkers will join the runners' trail at Axford. There will be no circles, check-backs etc - just a well-marked one-way path to Marlborough. These are the arrangements:

Walkers: please assemble at the public car-park in Axford (just east of the Red Lion) at 11.00 prompt. I will be there (in time - honestly!) to set you on your way, to pick up the trail at the southern bank of the Kennet. A map is attached to this Mag; please bring it with you, although the trail will be very clearly marked. Please arrange amongst yourselves who will drive whom to the start, and who will leave their cars at Marlborough to get a lift to Axford. I am sure we will all be happy to ferry people back to Axford after the Hash. Please give right of way (and water, beer, fags etc) to the runners, who will be on a timed race - many thanks. Distance is approx 3 miles, so should take you just over an hour.

Runners: you will start from outside the Bell at Ramsbury at 11.15 or whenever I arrive, whichever is the later. Park in the street. Please wear a (stop if possible) watch. Jeremy will set us all off at (probably) one-minute intervals, according to his highly personal assessment of our abilities. ALL ARE WELCOME TO PARTICIPATE, WHETHER RUNNING THE RELAY OR NOT! Please let Jeremy know in advance if you will be running, so he can cast his runes accordingly. As with the walkers, please arrange amongst (y)ourselves who drives whom where. Distance is just under 6 miles - an hour for me, 25 minutes for Jeremy. See map attached, but trail will be clearly laid - even if it is raining. Tripping, barging, boring and bad language are positively encouraged!
