The Jolly Tar, was formerly a farmhouse, it became a public house and opened in 1855. The jolly tar (or sailor) in question is Captain Willes Johnson who married the widow of Colonel Freke. Arkell's acquired the pub in 1922 after the break-up of the Freke Estate. In those days the right-hand side of the building - now the lounge - was a bicycle shop.

In 2007 a local paranormal research group investigated sightings of a ghost that frequents the pub.

It was the fifteenth of March (The Ides of March, in the Roman calender, was a festive Day dedicated to the god Mars) as we gathered round to hear Kevin and Anne give the traditional pre hash address. The day was bright sunny and warm and much good humoured chattering was in the air. The good weather had brought out many walkers. Kevin warned us it might be a little muddy.
